Originally, the function of banking and finance law was to provide a safe legal framework for contractual relations between lenders and borrowers. To better apprehend business law today, it is necessary to acquire basic knowledge on banking and finance law.

Furthermore, this course also provides guidelines for the students to better understand the ways financial markets are operating, especially in Europe.
